New Berlin Ambulance Service awarded \$75,000 under CREST Program

NEW BERLIN — The Village of New Berlin Ambulance Service has been awarded a Grant Distribution Agreement for a \$75,000 reimbursement grant under the New York State "Community Resiliency, Economic Sustainability, and Technology" (CREST) Program.

Village of New Berlin Mayor Peter Lennon said the funding will allow replenishment to the village user-funded account as funds were used last year for the purchase of the 2016 ambulance and communication system. He said the remaining reimbursement funds will be used to purchase a life-saving cardiac compression system. "It was last year, during our desperate search for an ambulance, Assemblyman Joe Angelino contacted me and said he had access

to funds through the NY State CREST Program," said Lennon. "He asked if I could make use of the \$75,000 reimbursable funding."

"We started our wheels turning at that point and worked closely with the Dormitory Authority of the State of New York (DASNY) to make sure the grant request was properly crafted," said Lennon. "Some things are reimbursable and some are not."

He said Angelino's Chief of Staff Laurie Gialanella was a great help in coordinating chase the cardiac compression system."

"The Cardiac Compression System is called a "Thumper" amongst team members," he said. "It's a wrap around system that actually does a cardiac massage, essentially it's CPR."

He said after the purchase of the cardiac system, they'll craft an additional proposal for grant reimbursement on that piece of equipment.

Lennon said the team in Albany works very hard to support the municipalities and they want the municipalities to have access to the money available through this program. Lennon gave thanks to the grant funding team as New Berlin Ambulance Service will continue providing top-quality medical first-response and transport services to New Berlin and neighbors for years to come.

Planning Department taps into clean energy grants for electric equipment

NORWICH – Citing an opportunity to store additional green energy grants through the New York State Research and Development Authority (NYSERDA), the Chenango County Department of Planning has purchased a cache of electric landscaping equipment to be used at county facilities.

The purchase utilizes \$10,000 recently awarded through NYSERDA's Clean Energy Communities Program which offers resources and funds for green energy projects to municipalities across the state.

The grant leverages another \$15,000 awarded to the county earlier this year. Funds were used to purchase three zero turn mowers for county facilities, as well as landscaping equipment to be used at the county-owned airport in Norwich. Electric weed eaters, leaf blowers, a chain saw, push mower, and batteries and charging equipment were shared with the Chenango Sheriff's Office and other county-run facilities.

"Existing equipment was outdated and we thought it would be a great investment for those departments," said Allison Yacano, Chenango County planner and Climate Smart Communities program coordinator.

"Having this renewable energy landscaping equipment helps achieve the goals and objectives of the office," said Chenango County Undersheriff Dustin Smietana. "The maintenance team will put the equipment through various tests to determine its performance and reliability. The data collected will inform the sheriff on future purchases for the agency."

Sheriff Ernest Cutting expressed gratitude to the Chenango Planning Department and Norwich Outdoor Power Equipment for their support.

NYSERDA has a list of measures that local governments can take to save energy, cut costs, and earn a clean energy community designation.

Chenango County was designated a Clean Energy Community in February 2019 after completing four out of ten high impact actions identified by NYSERDA. Designation allowed Chenango County to apply for a grant up to \$150,000 toward an additional clean energy project.

Alongside the purchase of electric landscaping equipment, the county has also used \$15,000 in NYSERDA awards to install LED lighting at the T-hangers of the Lt. Warrant E. Eaton Airport.

Rounding out the event will be free live

music all day long, starting with Junkyard Heights on the main stage from 1 to 2:30 p.m. Khalil Jade will take the acoustic stage from 2:30 to 3:30 p.m., followed by Nate Gross performing from 3:30 to 5 p.m. on the main stage. Finishing up the day will be Mark Nanni on the acoustic stage from 5 to 6 p.m., and Caviar and Grits playing from 6 to 8 p.m. on the main stage.

Testani encourages

residents of the area and beyond to stop by the fairgrounds and check out all the great products produced right here in Chenango County.

"Everything's free. Attendance is free, parking is free, the music is free, the kid zone is free. The only thing people have to pay for is anything they want to consume," said Testani.

"We wanted people to bring the whole family. If they just want to come down and listen to some music, they can. They won't have to spend a penny. formula while the cost of operation has drastically inflated.

MMOs establish monthly uniform prices paid to farmers by first classifying milk by its intended use.

There are four uniform "classes" in the MMO system: Class I: fluid milk; Class II: milk used to make soft products (ice cream, cottage

cheese, yogurt, etc.); Class III: milk used to make hard cheese products; Class IV: milk used to make butter and powdered dry milk products.

The USDA's proposed amendments to the MMO system include:

Updating milk composition factors to 3.3 percent true protein, 6 percent other solids, and 9.3 percent nonfat solids

Relying solely on the 40-pound block cheddar cheese price to determine the monthly average cheese price used in the formulas

Updating class III and class IV formula factors

Updating base class I skim milk price

Updating class I differential values to reflect the increased cost of servicing the class I market

ers.

The USDA's proposal pricing formulas across all 11 federal milk marketing orders (MMO) follows a 49-day national hearing held from August 2023 to January 2024, where the USDA heard testimony and received evidence on 21 proposals from the dairy industry.

"The USDA has put out a proposal that the Chenango County Farm Bureau supports," said Chenango County Farm Bureau President Terry Ives. "We think that this would ultimately be a good thing for farmers to

help with their costs."

Under current MMO standards, changes to milk pricing occur only when a USDA hearing process is requested. Changes to that system proposed by the USDA would require dairy processors to complete an annual survey detailing their costs, which would subsequently affect how much farmers get paid for their milk.

"The biggest problem with the MMO now is that they don't update it

often enough," said Mike Barnes, director of Agri-Mark, a northeast cooperative of family farms in New York, Connecticut, Maine, Massachusetts, and Vermont. "It's not until someone asks for a hearing. What they're trying to do is make the system more proactive than reactive.'

Since the last hearing was held in 2007, Barnes said his family farm in Mount Upton has been operating on an antiquated pricing

Community reading program presents central New York's evolving heritage

NORWICH – Otselic Valley Fishing and Heritage Association (OVF and HA)Vice-Chair Michael Foor-Pessin is pleased to announce a two part series community reading program.

The first part will be held from 4 to 8 p.m., July 31 with the second part from 1 to 3 p.m., Saturday, October 12, both on the campus of the Chenango County Historical Society Museum, located at 45 **Rexford Street.**

Foor-Pessin said for the third year in a row, the Roger Follett Foundation Inc has funded the reading program centered on nonfiction and fiction works. This year's title is "Journey Through Chenango: Land of the Oneidas".

"The free presentation is open to all residents and will be held in the Loomis Barn," said Foor-Pessin. "You don't have to be signed up for the reading program to attend."

Two books selected for the reading program this vear are Daniel Koch's "Land of the Oneidas" and Walter Edmond's "Drums Along the Mohawk."

He explained both books give a depth of information regarding the evolving heritage of central New York and the United States and revisit the revolutionary era from 1774 to 1783, when the Oneida Nation and other Haudenosaunee Nations engaged in helping American Patriots secure the war over the British.

In addition to the presentation, he said tours will be given of the Haudenosaunee exhibition at the museum from 4 to 6 p.m.

Foor-Pessin said attendees previously signed up for the program will receive a free copy of each book about a half hour before author

Members of the Oneida Nation will join Koch in the presentation and address this crucial Revolutionary time in America's history.

Foor-Pessin said Koch will be available for book signing after the presentation and participants not in the reading program can find a limited supply of "Land of the Oneidas" for sale at C.S. Miller Books locat-

ed at 14 Adams Street in Norwich.

He continued to brief on the second part of the series in October and said it coincides with the museums celebration of "Museums and More" and Indigenous People's

Day.

The two books distributed earlier will be discussed, along with guest speaker Jessica Farmer, who will share the story of Polly Cooper and the role she played in the American Revolution at Valley Forge and other topics.

The presentation will end with a film produced by the Oneida Nation, highlighting their role in the Revolutionary war.

Chenango in line for \$352,000 in multi-state vape marketing settlement

CHENANGO COUNTY - Chenango County will lay hold of nearly \$352,000 as part of a multi-state settlement with Juul Labs Inc. (Juul) for its role in the nationwide youth vaping epidemic.

Chenango County's share of settlement money will be funneled through the county's Public Health Department which is now undergoing a request for proposal (RFP) process to contract with an outside agency to utilize the funds, some of which already have a presence in local school districts. Hopes are to have an RFP awarded and programming in place by the fall, according to Chenango Public Health Director Isaiah Sutton. "This is an opportunity to set up a program and achieve an outcome without affecting local taxpayers," said Sutton. "Any time we can do that as a small rural community is a plus for us."

"Youth programming is high on our list of priorities," Sutton said. "I think if you speak to most school administrators, vaping is a huge issue. Kids see it in their peer groups. The biggest danger for vaping is folks who are getting it through a non reputable source. It's people making cartridges at home and mixing in other products and in that respect, it's an importdren," said New York Attorney General Letitia James. "The settlement I secured with Juul will help turn the tide on the youth vaping epidemic by providing new resources to Southern Tier schools and communities to combat vaping and ensuring JUUL will end its deceptive marketing. I thank my partners in the Southern Tier for their cooperation and commitment to keeping New York youth safe." After Juul launched in 2015, e-cigarette use among high school students skyrocketed and by 2019, the proliferation of vaping led to a national outbreak of severe vaping-related illnesses, according to the NY Attorney General. In October 2019, a 17-yearold male from the Bronx died due to a vaping-related illness, making him the first reported vaping-related fatality in New York, and the youngest vaping-related fatality in the United States.

goes off, then make sure each trap has your name tag on it. In New York, your tag can have either your name and address or your 12-digit NYSDEC ID number (which is on your license). Some people like the DEC ID number so that if someone finds their trap that doesn't like trapping, they cannot find you. Environmental Conservation Officers can put the ID in their computers to get your information if they need to contact you about your traps. Once you have checked all the traps and made sure they are good to go, slightly open the jaws and insert a nail unless they are rubber-jawed traps. I use a piece of wire and make a loop and put 4-6 traps on a loop at the end of their chains. While there are many ways to boil your traps, I like to use a turkey fryer and a large stock pot.

Some people use small water tubs used for livestock and I've seen guvs use old beer kegs that were cut open. Fill the pot about hallway with water and put some degreaser in the water (toilet cleaner works well surprisingly). Bring the water to a boil and lower in a group of traps slowly. Depending on the trap size, you can sometimes get multiple bunches in the water at a time. Let the trap sit in the pot for about half an hour. After taking them off, spray them with a garden hose to remove any wax that might have clung on after pulling the traps up out of the water (the wax floats on the water). Hang the traps to dry someplace. I like to stand a pallet up and put nails across the top, hanging each wired loop of traps from a nail. Keep putting in traps and taking them out until you have done all of them.

Let the traps sit outside for a week at a minimum to start getting some surface rust. The porosity of the rust lets the dve soak in better. Using the same pot as before, fill it about halfway with water and start heating it. I like logwood dye powder; one packet covers a couple dozen traps usually. Follow the direction on the packet for how long to leave your traps in the dye. The final step is to wax your traps. You should do this the same day as dyeing your traps if possible. I keep my wax in a separate pot to keep it from being contaminated and as scent-free as possible. Warm us the wax slowly and wait for it to look like fryer oil. Make sure your traps don't have any water on them as the water will cause the wax to spurt and gurgle. Slowly lower a bundle of traps

into the melted wax. Immediately you will see a heavy layer of wax form on the traps since they are colder than the wax. Wait a few minutes until that heavy layer melts off as the traps get warmer. Now you can remove the traps from the pot and let the wax drip back into the pot for 10 or 15 seconds. Take the bundle and hang it to air dry out of direct sunlight. Once all the traps have been waxed and are dry, remove them from their bundle, scrape the excess wax off the dog and pan latch, remove the nail

from between the jaws, set the trap and test fire it. Make sure it fires as a reasonable pan level and under the right amount of pressure on the pan. If the trap passes this, add a cable stake (if you use cable stakes) and place it into a plastic tote.



The Norwich YMCA and Gus Macker look forward to returning in 2025 for the 28th annual tournament.





County mortgage tax waiting on governor's signature Chenango

NORWICH - Home buyers in Chenango County may soon see an additional fee to their closing cost allowed under home rule regulation, provided that the tax measure is signed by the state governor.

A home rule request

through the legislature in Albany had been submitted by the county board earlier this year with intent to add a quarter percent mortgage recording tax on real property.

The state already imposes a basic tax of 50 cents per \$100, but also gives counties choosing power to enact an added

tax of up to 50 cents per \$100. The county's quarter percent proposal would mean that someone buying a \$100,000 property can expect an additional \$250 in their closing fees.

County officials say the one-time expense for home buyers would bring in between \$150,000 and \$200,000

per year which would offset costs of digitizing public records and pay for one additional employee in the county clerk's office. Leftover revenue would be used to lower real property tax bills.

The Chenango County Board of Supervisors approved the same home rule measure in 2023;

and while it was passed by the state assembly, it stalled in the senate. This year it was passed by both houses in the legislature and is now awaiting the governor's signature.

"I highly doubt this won't be signed. I don't see this as being a very controversial issue," said Chenango County
