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Timberwolves not satisfied with last year's turnaround

Sometimes you have to take one step back in order to move two steps forward.

That was the decision Sherburne-Earlville's football program made heading into the fall, 2023 campaign.

The Marauders, now Timberwolves, program, which found a great deal of success through most of the 2010s decade, had fallen on hard times.

The last season in which it won more than four games was 2017, when it won six games in a row at one point to qualify for the Section III, Class C playoffs.

Since that season, the Marauders not only failed to make the playoffs, but struggled to pick up wins at times.

The 2020 season was played in the spring of 2021due to COVID-19 cancellations, and the 2021 season was played a few months later. Combined, the Marauders lost all 11 games.

Some progress was made in 2022 – S-E won two games – but competing for Section III championships was not likely in the immediate future.

Fortunately, an option to compete on an equal footing with schools in the same predicament presented itself.

Section III, knowing it had a large complement of Class C and Class D schools, recognized the competitive gap. It subsequently formed a new C2-D2 division for 11-man programs that had not had much success in recent sea-

While the sectional playoff format remained, the C2-D2 division members were excluded from playing for a state title.

Still, the concept proved successful as several teams – S-E included – had their best seasons in recent years.

"Most of the teams that we used to play have moved to 8-man football," said S-E head coach Steve Franklin, whose team remains in 11-man competition. "I applaud our section for recognizing that not all schools (that still play 11-man football) are at the same level."

The Marauders finished 7-3 overall losing in the C-2-D2 sectional championship game. Despite winning more games than the previous three seasons combined, Franklin said the remaining players believe there is unfinished business.

"I think our kids still have a bitter taste in their mouths," Franklin said of that season-ending loss to Southern Hills. "(The players) are more focused about getting back and finishing it this year. They aren't satisfied with what happened last year."

If the Timberwolves are to repeat last year's success,

they will have to fill a huge void at quarterback.

Darren Miles set nearly every school record for passing in last year's campaign, his fourth as a starting signal-caller for the Marauders.

Overall, Franklin said the roster turnover amounts to 15 of 22 starting positions that will see new faces.

Hayden Price, a starter at safety last year and a backup to Miles at QB, will look to fill the shoes of Miles. Franklin said Price is one of the hardest working kids on the squad, and he looked good in the team's intrasquad scrimmage.

While the number of returning starters at skill positions is scant, dynamic dual receiving/rushing threat, Nick Hull, returns for the Timberwolves.

Hull found the end zone nearly a dozen and a half times a season ago, and caught what is believed a school-record 40 passes.

Justin Race also returns in the backfield. Race worked in as a wingback last season, and Franklin figures he will fill that role again.

At receiver and tight end, Garrett Winton, Noah Ackermann, Preston Proskine, Brayden O'Hara, and Cameron Mason will see time.

The receivers will see their share of balls in the air, but that won't be their primary responsibility.

"Most of the receivers are newer to the positions," Franklin said. "We ask our receivers to block. If you're not willing to block, there is no chance you'll get on the field in our offense."

Where S-E can bank on stalwart play is on the offensive line. Landon Andrade is the most veteran returning player who will start on the interior on both sides of the ball.

"It all starts (the line) with Landon," Franklin said. "He's a stud, and is willing to do whatever we ask of him."

Aidan Kiehn, Aiden Schroer, and Charlie Potrzeba are also slated for starting spots. Ashton Copeland and Andrew Menard will also vie for starting time at tackle.

Projected offensive line starter, Dilen Maceda, will miss the season as he is recovering from a knee injury suffered in the summer.

"We're hoping the offensive line is a strength of our team," Franklin said. "We have six seniors playing on the line.

Forecasting this year's outlook, Franklin has the same expectation as last year's result with the only difference a better ending.

"We're not reinventing the wheel this season, and that is a good thing," he said. "We've built the reputation as a physical football program, and we're hoping to keep that reputation intact this year. We can't dwell on last year. We hope to get a different result."



B-G Volleyball: "Consistency and Determination"



B-G started its 2024 season at an even 1-1 with a win over Hancock and a loss to Oxford. B-G will have two road matches before hosting Oxford again on September





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


The Bobcats will see a shift to their 2024 schedule with having their divisional games at the end rather than in the middle to give them a better outlook towards where they


"The main focus always

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
Greene Boys Soccer: "Dedicated and focused on working as a team"




Greene Golf: Looking to defend MAC title

The expectation of that next-man-up mantra is that the backup will fill in for the injured starter, and do so at a level of competency where there isn't much drop-off in the level of play.

That expectation sounds good in theory, but the reality is that even at the highest level of sports, starters are starters for good reason.

So, when you operate a small high school football program with little room for hiccups of any kind, injuries to starting players can prove especially brutal.

Most of the aforementioned players on the offensive side of the ball will also pull double duty on the defensive side of the ball in some capacity.


Among those cast as primarily defensive starters are Tiernan Lindsay at linebacker, Ryan Evans on the defensive line, and Turner at defen-

Norwich Boys Soccer: Excited to return in 2024



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
Afton/Harpursville Field Hockey: Being more technical while improving team chemistry



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Oxford Boys Soccer: "Making steady improvements with a new season ahead"



"We are returning several starters who will need to elevate their play for us to be successful," Thorne said. "Once Abby knocks the rust



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
